A Budget reflects the Activities of a Group in terms of Dollars !!

Think about it! Your club, in getting ready for the next Lions Year (July 1, 2011 through June 30, 2012), will be looking at great things to do that are “planned”, and realistically, possibly even more that are “unplanned”, in the form of “tragic emergencies” or “rapidly appearing needs” that will affect people in your local community. The only way your club can Be Prepared to Serve your community as best, and rapidly, as possible will be to spend some time soon developing your 2011-12 budgets – both “Activities (Charity)” and “Administrative”.

gives valuable info on how to do this process. Most importantly, each year we charge a new Club President and Leadership Team to do the best they can in *Serving their community*. But **TOO often**, that “New” President has not had a hand in developing the budget for their “presidential year”. A Team of “Good Olde (*Make that “Seasoned”*) Lions (Well-Meaning, *of course*) may produce a budget that will be of the “always do what we have always done – always get what we’ve always got(*ten*)” variety. This will leave the new president “captive” to a budget that may not really reflect the new president’s goals.

One of the beauties of “one year terms of office” is that we get one year to make great new strides, OR only one year to make a mess that can (hopefully) be corrected by a new president in the following year. Conduct that budget building with the Lion who will lead the budget as Club President being a member of the budget building team. And do it soon, as the year begins July 1 !! The budget provides **information, discipline, and proof**. See page 14 for the rest of those **thoughts!!!** You will see that a Good, **Well Planned Budget**, with some “unallocated charity funding” {*that each year seems to” find a good home*} will really make every one’s “Lions Lives” much more fun and productive.

My Dear Fellow Lions and Leos,

I am deeply humbled by the generous outpouring of support from Lions worldwide to my call last week to donate funds to the Foundation's Japan Relief Fund. Already, LCIF has received donations or [commitments exceeding US\\$6 million](#), including US\$3 million that the Lions of Japan are working to raise themselves during their own crisis. Again, it's so very humbling to see such compassion by the network of caring Lions and osworldwide. I thank all who have already donated from the bottom of my heart.

With the expected death toll now exceeding 18,000 and rising, the devastation is clearly greater than anyone could have imagined. And more than 400,000 people are still in shelters, in the cold, often going without a hot meal for days on end.

Now that the roads have re-opened, Lions from all over Japan are sending relief aid from every corner of the country -- 30 tons of rice is being sent from Sapporo, US\$50,000 worth of baby formula from Hokkaido, and women's health products from the southern area of Shikoku - all through the Lions network in Japan. Within a day of the disaster, many courageous clubs distributed 20 tons of food, water and emergency supplies, despite great risks and challenges to themselves. Even our Lions blue-colored Lions relief tents are being delivered to give shelter for Lions volunteers and other relief workers in the hardest-hit areas.

To distribute the aid effectively, the Lions of Japan quickly set up four Lions relief aid warehouses in affected areas. Lions are coordinating relief aid distribution with local government officials and with the Japanese Red Cross. As a result, Lions are helping coordinate blood donation campaigns within Japan.

As you know, we have 31 Lions clubs in Sendai - the largest city affected by the quake - and nearly a club in every town up and down the coastline. Whether it's clothes and food today, or shelter next week, or a wheel chair the week after, Lions will be there to give dignity to those who have suffered such unimaginable pain and suffering.

**While many of you have [already generously donated](#), for which I am very thankful, please encourage your fellow Lions, Leos and friends to also [donate](#). Please know that every donation will be put to careful use, and 100 percent will go to the cause. Also, donations received between March 11 and June 30, 2011 will be eligible for Melvin Jones Fellowships.**

I am again humbled by your generosity to date. The Lions of Japan have always been there for the rest of us in times of need. So I am proud of you, and never prouder to be a Lion, when we come to their aid in the wake of this historic, awful tragedy.

**At the State Council meeting held February 5<sup>th</sup>, 2011, the Council of Governors approved the change from a Multiple District 14 Leo Committee to a Leo Coordinator Position as it follows the recommendation outlined by Lions Clubs International. The Coordinator shall serve a three-year appointment as outlined by Lions Clubs International. The appointment may be made from any sub-district in the Multiple District. The appointment will be made at the State Council meeting in May prior to the State Convention. The Coordinator's major role is to provide encouragement, coaching, and motivational aids for all Lions, especially district Leo Clubs Chairpersons. A Lion wishing to serve in this position shall have knowledge of the Leo program; have served as a club liaison, sub-district chairperson or worked with other youth groups in the community; have good communications skills. Any Lion interested in this position may contact the PA Lions State Office at (717) 564- 2586 for further details regarding qualifications and duties. The Lion must submit a resume to the District Governor no later than April 1<sup>st</sup>. The District Governor will in turn submit the resume to the State Office no later than April 10<sup>th</sup>.**
